I. Call to Order and Welcome

II. Approval of Minutes

Tyler moved to approve the minutes. The motion was seconded by Preskenis. All Ayes. The motion passed.

III. Special Presentation - Micah BlackLight - Ancestor's Future: Crystallizing Our Call

Micah BlackLight presented the background and current status of his project: Ancestor's Future: Crystallizing Our Call. (See agenda packet)

BlackLight explained the project was inspired by the 'Say Their Names' memorial and has received Parks approval for installation at Ashland Creek Park, and has received local support and regional attention. Blacklight explained the project is ready to receive funding to actualize a 3-D rendering which will enable a more accurate estimate of the total project cost.

Donations for the project are currently being accepted by the Parks Foundation, but fiscal sponsorship was recently secured through the Peace House and funds received by the Parks Foundation will transfer over (currently around \$30K).

The committee discussed the history of the 'Say Their Names' memorial at railroad park, its vandalism, and the recent permanent playwrights' plaque installation there featuring a quote from Lorraine Hansberry. The committee discussed these efforts as stepping stones for BlackLight's project. The committee discussed that the Oregon Remembrance Project and Ashland Sunrise Project are behind this as it supports repair and reconciliation. The committee discussed how it can support this project and asked BlackLight to let the committee know how it can support moving forward.

Greenspan: The last planning meeting included discussion about what is considered to be 'affordable' housing in a particular development: Is a 500 square-foot dwelling at \$400K really considered affordable (just due to its small size) compared to other dwellings in the same development?

Tyler: Discussion at the last CEPAC meeting included consideration of a gas tax that would affect about six stations in the City with the majority of expected revenue coming from out of the area. Discussion also included EV and electric bicycle rebates.

Sage: Gooden updated the committee that he received Sage's formal resignation from the committee earlier in the day.

Preskenis: was not able to make the last TAC meeting.

Simon: did not make the last PAAC meeting. DuQuenne shared that Kate Russell and Peter Finkle looked at and adopted art for the traffic-signal boxes project. Preskenis added that unselected art will be held for new events. The committee considered a future agenda item for discussing the idea of relocating the statue of 'Pioneer Mike' from Ashland Plaza and replacing it with something that might reflect the City better, such as the second Guanajuato Heart that needs a permanent home. The committee discussed how to solicit alternative views of this idea and considered approaching Finkle for suggestions.

Mendel: HHSAC had its last meeting at Opportunities for Housing, Resources, and Assistance (OHRA) with a full tour. Discussion included that 65% of OHRA's budget goes to navigation services. The committee discussed its interest in hearing from the new 2200 Ashland Street Committee once it gets off the ground, and considered how it might support Ashland's unhoused population.

Smith: Parks discussion included sliding scale fees for the Community Center and Pioneer Hall which are not yet set.

Smith and Mendel: CoCoConvo- (Monthly meeting of committee chairs) - Smith and Mendel attended and discussion included the proposed Enhanced Law Enforcement Area (ELEA) ordinance. The committee discussed adding this as an agenda item for SERJAC to consider and come up with a position, which us up for a first reading on September 16th City Council meeting. Discussion also included how the 2200 Ashland street facility and related programming will be able to support Ashland's unhoused population.

VI. Unfinished Business

1. Belonging Survey - Update from subcommittee and committee discussion on use

Committee requested that Council Liaisons seek Council direction on how to conduct, compile, and report results from the Belonging Survey. Discussion included benefits of multiple modes in conducting the survey, such as by electronic means such as Survey Monkey, in-person with paper surveys while tabling at local events and/or locations such as the Food Bank, online through the City's website and/or City Manager's report, and through newsletters and/or other organizations' platforms. - Preskenis offered to start a working group to consider format, etc.
