I. Call to Order

The meeting was called to order at 4:33pm

Present were committee members John Tyler, Sean Smith, Catherine Greenspan, Emily Simon, Allison Mendel, and Brandon Polanco.

Also present were council liaison Gina DuQuenne and staff liaison Kerrick Gooden.

Polanco has received the preliminary draft report/document from Smith. They will be collaborating as a working group on a report to present to the committee at large.

2. Discussion: Regional ICE presence

The committee discussed its work in developing a draft proclamation for the Mayor's consideration opposing any development of an ICE detention center in the region due to overtaxing local infrastructure. Discussion included the press release issued by the city of Coos Bay and what other cities have done. Simon shared her discussion with Graham that it should come to the city council for the study session of Monday, August 3. Members discussed inviting interested parties to provide testimony at that time. The committee discussed hope for subsequent adoption at the business

meeting of August 18, and discussed needing to provide a final draft by July 24th for inclusion on the agenda packet for the August 3 study session. The committee also discussed the efforts of the Rogue Valley Migrant Watch and how their testimony might be helpful to understand, and Mendel offered to inform the affinity groups that attended the previous SERJAC meetings on this issue.

Mendel shared that PAAC discussed the playwrights walk and its booth at the 4th of July events that included two finished playwrights plaques that are ready for installation. There will be 15 plaques installed in July, with three by women playwrights to be placed at OSF, Plaza, and the Chamber on July 17 during an exclusive event featuring Tim Bond. Mendel will help draft the narrative that will go on the website. The committee discussed importance of Railroad Park plaque and remembering Aiden Ellison in the narrative.

Smith shared that Parks discussed Hunter Park pool access – SERJAC may be interested in equitable access. Similar SERJAC interest may be warranted for East Main Park and ICE Rink, and there are open vacancies on it's Trails Committee.

Mendel shared that CoCoConvo discussed committee meeting frequency reduction for SERJAC and PAAC. Decided to draft letter to CM and have chairs meet with Cotta to discuss further.

Mendel shared that HHSAC is working on its community resource fair for Sept. 9 at the Bellview Grange, and that SERJAC will have a table like last year.

The committee also discussed the report of the release and retrial for the person responsible for the death of Aidan Ellison. Discussion included the potential for an annual memorial day proclamation honoring Aidan Ellison, and the committee was in support and agreed to discuss as an agenda item and about hosting this at the Ancestors Future: Crystallizing Our Call that will have been installed by the date of his memorial.
