AGENDA REVIEW

Introductions were made and the agenda was reviewed.

MINUTES OF AUGUST 7, 2024

Reviewed and approved with an addition to clarify the reason for the data that followed:

Debbie expressed concern that we have looked at crime data but have not talked about mental health or substance abuse. She shared her review of the last six months of police reports that show 23 calls to respond to suicide (attempted and/or completed) as an illustration of mental health conditions that surface in the public arena due to the severe lack of mental health services.

FOLLOW-UP ITEMS

1. **OHRA Information** - Jan stated that she sent questions raised at the last meeting to Cass Sinclair, requesting information prior to the next committee meeting:

From 8/7/24 Meeting Minutes: “Committee members raised two issues about how the existence of the OHRA Center is impacting the neighborhood.

- One issue focused on people who opt out or are excluded from OHRA and “exit to the neighborhood.” Since, as a Project Turnkey site, the center serves all of Jackson County, how could people who came from outside of Ashland be transported to their original community? People are offered transportation assistance, but they make their own choices.
 - *Requests: Data on residents’ “home community” and the geographic location where they exit to. Data on exits to different types of situations (streets, institutions, temporary locations, permanent housing). Data on how many residents exited voluntarily or involuntarily annually.*
- The other issue focused on public drug and alcohol use. Since OHRA residents cannot

use substances on the property, it is presumed that those who use substances go somewhere in the neighborhood to partake.

- *Request: Information about how and the number of residents who are connected to treatment services while at OHRA. Information about outreach efforts and other pathways from the streets to treatment services.”*

2. **Economic Development / Transit Triangle Land Use Overlay** – The group discussed the fact that the City of Ashland needs to update its economic development plan, which was adopted about 15 years ago. Tonya noted that the city has an economic development analyst who will be conducting an inventory of commercial lands, which is a first step. In the meantime, the Transit Triangle Land Use Overlay opens up greater possibilities for development in this part of town. ‘

The group touched on a number of other items mentioned at previous meetings:

Allison questioned if the City has facility needs and is looking for other space. Tonya stated that the City is actually in the midst of a facilities masterplan.

Ruth asked about relocating the police substation from the shopping center to 2200 Ashland St., suggesting there would be a cost savings. Trina shared her understanding that the City had invested \$30k to remodel that space and signed a seven year lease at \$2,000/month.

Matt noted that Rogue Community Health will be providing mental health services at their facility across Ashland St. soon.

Trina questioned where the funds will come from for 2200 Ashland St., stating that it is difficult to plan without having any funding. She also expressed concerns should the City want to increase taxes to pay for new services at the site.

Jeff Dahl noted that local taxes are capped, so that would not be the case, and, if City dollars were to be used they would have to come from the General Fund, which pays for Fire, Police, and other existing services, which would be equally unlikely.

Tonya noted that to search for funding, we first need a plan. If there is not a plan, there will certainly be no funding.

Jan expressed the need for a plan that is not so specific that funding would be hard to find, but guidelines specific enough should grants or other funding be identified, the guidelines (plan) could be used as criteria to determine whether that opportunity would be right for 2200 Ashland St.

3. **City Building Codes** – Steve Matiaco provided an overview of the Excel spreadsheet sent with the meeting agenda. The discussion focused on requirements for residential use. Steve confirmed that any residential use would require a fire suppression system. He described several types of residential uses which would require distinct types of fire suppression systems. He also confirmed that having an adequate fire suppression system would negate the need to alter the windows in sleeping rooms.

Tonya asked about mixed use, such as office space and residential. Steve noted that mixed use is certainly possible and it would trigger or default to the most restrictive building codes (codes for residential use, in that case).

Steve stated that Pallet houses are not under the City's building codes, so he couldn't speak to their use. Jan explained requirements for using HUD funding for Pallet houses, which include having a cluster (more than one) and access to adequate shower and restroom

facilities, as well as kitchen or meal services. The units themselves need to have electricity, ventilation, and heat, as well as cooling if in a “hot climate” such as Arizona.

4. **Properties used during a community emergency** – Jan reported on her follow-up conversation with Kelly Burns, Ashland Emergency Manager about properties identified for potential use during a community emergency. Kelly had shared that the American Red Cross (ARC) used to “pre identify” community spaces and manage contracts or memoranda of understanding should the space be needed. The ARC no longer does this, so properties have to be contacted once an emergency is eminent or has occurred.

Jan referenced emailed information included in the agenda packet (attached) about how 2200 Ashland St. might be used during a community emergency. She reminded the group about information shared at the previous meeting on the City and SOU’s agreement for a central command center on the SOU campus. Other buildings, such as 2200 Ashland St. would be used to distribute supplies (e.g., sandbags, air purifiers, water).

PREPARING INFORMATION FOR PUBLIC REVIEW

Jan reviewed a list of possibilities that are not being considered for the property. After discussion, the group confirmed these items should not be considered for the site:

- Tent camping
- Car camping
- Low barrier sheltering
- Congregate sheltering
- Walk up shelter
- Flea market
- Maker space
- Permanent Pallet houses

Conversely, there were three items on the list of what to include:

- Severe weather sheltering (heat, cold, and smoke)
- “Resiliency hub” in the event of a community emergency (a site for distribution of supplies)
- An Advisory Council with representatives from the neighborhood

The next task was to determine which of the possibilities previously identified might be eliminated from consideration and which will remain under consideration and be included when gathering public input. The group took time to individually complete the worksheet included in the packet prior to discussion, answering the question, “Does it stay on the list of possibilities?”

1 = no 2 = not likely 3 = probably 4 = definitely

Focusing only on the “daytime uses,” Jan asked how many items were rated as a “1” and how many were rated as a “4”. After discussion, the group agreed to eliminate the following daytime activities from further consideration:

- Resource Center
- Day Center
- Urban Rest Stop

The group will work through the rest of the possibilities at the next meeting.

PUBLIC FORUM

Alexandra Reid, who coordinates Laundry Love, thanked the committee for its work. She shared that she has identified donors who will contribute the funding to purchase commercial grade washers and dryers, with the desire that they be placed inside the 2200 Ashland St. building for use by unsheltered individuals/families. She envisions the same protocol whereby people sign up at OHRA for a time to do their laundry, and Laundry Love would continue to provide volunteers to check people in and oversee the use of the machines.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

Debbie Neisewander announced that State Representative Pam Marsh is speaking at the Ashland Library on September 3, for those who might be interested.

1.d. "if equipped properly" - **building would need a radio tower/antenna installed and radio equipment available on the interior (last quote I received to install this at our joint-EOC was close to \$30K). Building needs a large capacity generator for when the electric grid goes down (I don't know the costs, I know this is expensive and it adds to the workload of facilities maintenance for the City).**

and what constitutes "a decent space" for 3.a. - **the office section of the building constitutes a decent space for regional trainings or what could be a training center. What I mean by this is there's parking around the exterior, there are breakout rooms and a main conference/classroom, and accessible bathrooms. Installing some reliable means of media presentation equipment (screens, projectors, supplies) would make for a decent space for regional trainings. Hope that makes sense, otherwise ignore my poor sentence and description of a "decent space".**

For example:

Would it work best with one large room? multiple rooms? separate entrances? sizes? **Not sure how to respond to this.**

If it had a kitchen, would that be ideal, or unnecessary? **Possibly useful, I don't know.**

Showers? **Also possibly useful, but I don't have a strong opinion on this. Both the kitchen and showers might be useful if the space becomes a regional EOC for major disasters. The kitchen and showers could be utilized by management teams pulling long hours to support local major events.**

Would the garage door and bay be helpful to keep? **Having a garage door to receive deliveries of supplies and goods is a very good idea. Yes, keep the door.**

Would it need to have turnaround space for large vehicles? **The parking area is a loop, I don't believe there would need to be, but I don't have a strong opinion on this.**

Let me know if I can clarify further. Thanks for your work on this.

- Provide a pathway to long-term housing for Ashland residents who are experiencing homelessness, possibly including immediate shelter
- Support wider community goals, such as emergency management, social equity and racial justice, and climate action
