I. CALL TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order at 4:32pm

V. UPDATE FROM MEMBERS (20 min)

Committee discussed the importance of SERJAC's existence, its work, and people knowing about it.

Simon suggested looking at how similar committees/commissions in other municipalities are doing their work and will take on looking at Medford's Commission on Access, Equity, Diversity and Inclusion (CAEDI)

Staff liaison will identify similar committees in Portland, Eugene, Bend, Redmond. Discussion occurred regarding National Alliance on Mental Illness. Annual Rogue Community Health annual luncheon, well-being and belonging as well as building civic muscle.

1. Report from Tara about Indigenous People's Day (5 min)

Tara reported regarding the great turnout at SOU's Indigenous Peoples Day celebration. Committee discussed continuing to build the relationship with the Native American Student Union (NASU) and SOU's Native Nation's Liaison Kenwani Kravitz and other local Native-led organizations such as Red Earth Descendants.

2. Report from Allison regarding Housing and Human Services Committee (10 min)

Mendel reported on her attendance at the Housing and Human Services Committee meeting. Committee discussed the positive potential for ongoing collaboration with this committee with its related goals and values.

3. Updates from members regarding connections with assigned committees (5 min)

Simon reported SO Pride Parade turnout was low this year. Committee discussed community engagement strategies.

Tyler and Sage will attend the next CEPAC (Climate and Energy Policy Advisory Committee) meeting and report at next meeting. Tyler offered to go to also go to next APRC (Ashland Parks and Recreation Commission) meeting, and Sage offered to go to next Planning Commission meeting.

VI. NEW BUSINESS (60 min)

1. Strategic Planning: short-term, mid-term, and long-term goals. (30 min)

Houston suggested a short-term goal of developing DEI assessment for the community to address the committee charge to survey the community every two years. Houston suggested a launch in the first quarter of next year and clarified it would not be for demographics, but rather 'climate' survey about their experiences in businesses, etc. Committee discussed approaching SOU for help.

Mendel suggested a short term goal to provide better visibility of the State of Oregon's postings for reporting discrimination and harassment. Committee discussed requesting funds for printing.

Committee discussed committee communications, public meeting law, and considerations for a Google working document. Staff liaison will explore how other committee's work with this and if other platforms exist. Committee suggested short-term goal for creating better internal communications platform. To remain in compliance with public meeting law, all communications currently go through staff liaison who distributes to voting members to prevent violation of public meeting law.

Simon suggested the short-term goal of recruitment for committee with people who

care and show up for the work at and between meetings. Committee discussed collaborating with SOU's Equity Diversity and Inclusion Office, other groups, and benefits for involvement from SOU.

Houston suggested developing SERJAC visibility as a mid-term goal. Mendel suggested mid-term goal of networking with other committees and organizations doing similar work. Committee discussed.

Committee discussed next steps.
